9. MONTHLY DISPLAY

There is a minor change to the Monthly Display Categories and points will be awarded to the winner of the popular vote.

This monthly display involves allocating three points for 1st place and two points for 2nd place in each of the categories. Awards are given at the end of the year (December) for the overall winner and a cash prize for the highest points scorer in each category. Members need a minimum of six points in a category to be considered for an award. The competition runs from February to November. Plants must be benched by 7.15pm and judging will commence at 7.20pm.

12. ORCHID APPRECIATION WORKSHOP

An invitation is extended to members to attend an Orchid Appreciation Workshop on Sunday 24th March commencing 10.00am at the Kempsey Heights Bowling Club. Some people have already confirmed their interest but we need prior notice from everyone hoping to attend to ensure that the area to be booked is sufficient to accommodate all.

The course, which will extend over a number of sessions, will be delivered by AOC judges from across the State including some who are knowledgeable growers in specific fields.

The course is aimed at all growers from the beginner to the expert. The aims include:


- 1. an appreciation of the various genera,
- an understanding of the Australian Orchid Council (AOC) Judging system and how judges judge orchid plants at shows, what makes an award quality orchid in the eyes of judges;
- 3. the role of the Show Marshall and how that role function better, provide an understanding of show schedule management and the classes in which plants should be exhibited;
- provide guidance and gain practical experienced to judge at monthly meetings; and
- 5. allow participants to better contribute to the workings of the society with the knowledge and confidence individuals gain.

The course cost, a one-off fee of \$50.00, will cover all printed notes, handouts and copies of Powerpoint Presentations supplied to participants.

Participants will have the opportunity, if they wish, to complete set assignments during the course to reinforce their understanding of the course topics. This will help the course presenters keep abreast of the participants' strengths and weaknesses in order to make adjustments to the modules where necessary and participants who complete all modules

will be invited to undertake practical and theory exams which could lead to them becoming an Associate Judge, if they wish.

13. EARLY ORCHID COLLECTORS

William and Thomas Lobb were born in Cornwall and began their horticultural training on the Cornish estate of Sir Charles Lemon, whose name is perpetuated by the well known orchid, Coelogyne cristata 'Lemoniana'. In the 1830s they both sought employment in Veitch's nursery, which by then had established a branch in Exeter, and was destined soon to become (for a time) the largest nursery in Britain (and the rest of the world).

In 1840 William Lobb was sent to South America to collect cold-tolerant plants, thus becoming the first in a long line of collectors sent abroad by Veitch's nursery over the next 60 years. His first major introduction to European horticulture was Araucaria araucana, the monkey puzzle tree. Sales of its seeds and seedlings alone were sufficient to pay Veitch's expenses for the expedition, thus persuading him to send more collectors abroad. William Lobb introduced many other plants on this and subsequent trips but few were orchids. His greatest claim to fame was probably the discovery of Calveras Grove in the Sierra Nevada of California, a group of 80 or 90 giant sequoia trees (Sequoiadendron giganteum) measuring 250-320 feet tall and 10-20 feet in diameter. Over 150 years later, Calveras Grove is still a major tourist attraction, and giant sequoia trees can now be found growing in temperate countries all around the world, although none are yet as large as those growing wild in California.

Meanwhile, William's brother Thomas was sent by Veitch to collect tropical and sub-tropical plants, orchids and tropical pitcher plants (Nepenthes spp.) in various Asian countries. A succession of trips took him to Singapore, Malaya, Burma, Java, the Philippines and India. Some of the orchids that Thomas Lobb introduced to cultivation for the first time include Dendrobium infundibulum, Vanda coerulea, Aerides fieldingii (syn. A. rosea) and Paphiopedilum villosum. The loss of a leg resulted in his premature retirement in 1860. His name is perpetuated by the widely grown Bulbophyllum lobbii. B

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14. COELOGYNE "PANDURATA"

I have had a green Coelogyne for about 10 years which grows well for me here in Coffs Harbour. It was labelled pandurata but I know there is some discussion about whether the orchids labelled pandurata here in Australia are really pandurata or whether they are Burfordiense which is a hybrid of pandurata with asperata. I am now fairly confident my plant is Coelogyne Burfordiense.



This is my plant and the orange markings on the lip probably identify it as Coelogyne Burfordiense with the markings coming from Coelogyne asperata.

And then there is a very rare form of Coelogyne pandurata "alba" which might confuse things.
