Table Talk: This month Ed gave the table talk and started by congratulating Helen Seiver on her beautiful Laeliinae, when asked what her regime is she said watering with half strength Campbells Yellow fertiliser and various trace elements including dolomite. Di Blay's Paphiopedilums were a picture she has the knack to produce beautiful plants. The stunning colour of Helen Seiver's Dendrobium was also noted. There was an increase in number of Cymbidiums benched mainly the cascading varieties which seem to do better in our warmer climate.

5. DOUG BINN'S TALK

Doug's love of plants is centred around the orchids, bromeliads & cacti of Brazil – specifically the Central Out Range where all 3 grow together in many areas. The rocky terrain where the 3 groups of plants grow is at an altitude of 2000mts, there are undulating sandstone and quartz outcrops that go for miles. The rainfall is around 1500mm per annum similar to our total in Coffs.

Doug normally travels there in May or June (a non-rainy time) as walking for miles in the rain may be rewarding finding a plant in flower which he hasn't seen before but being cold and wet on a bleak rocky outcrop can be soul destroying.

Doug gave a slide show of the typical areas he visited in the Central Outrange. There were many shots of all 3 plant varieties growing side by side in the bleakest of conditions. The orchid varieties that Doug saw were Bulbophyllum, rock dwelling Cattleya, Epidendrum, Lycaste, Oncidium in scrubby areas along with Cyrtopodium, Habenaria is a terrestrial orchid found in sandy areas, & Vanilla orchids happily grow in palms.

The Bromeliads Genera that Doug observed were Dyckia, Tillandsia, Vriesea, Hohenbergia & Orthophytum (now Sincoraea). He bought along a mature Sincoraea albopicta and donated 2 smaller plants to our raffle.

To venture into these areas in Brazil, ideally you need to have a basic knowledge of Portuguese, stay in hotels and B&B's. Check out the National Parks and know where you can and can't go. Google maps could also be a help.

9. ORCHIDS in CHURCHES

When Judy and I were in England in May we learned about orchid carvings in one England's impressive cathedrals, St. Albans in Hertfordshire. Like many of these cathedrals it has a history dating back more than a thousand years during which it has variously been an abbey, a church, a school and now a cathedral.

The restoration of what had become a very dilapidated structure took place during the late 1800s and carvings of Coelogyne cristata, Miltoniopsis vexillara and Cattleya trianae, as well as other flowers, ferns and fruit were carved into the columns.

12. ORCHID BARK and CHARCOAL

With Spring fast approaching, the potting season is about to commence. Make sure you have adequate supplies of bark so that you can easily get this task done.

The Society has bags of high quality Orchiata bark in two common sizes – 9 to 12mm and 12 to 18mm. Bags are priced at \$25 per 40 litre bag. Contact Bob Southwell (0417 695 834) for pick up or delivery at the next meeting.

The charcoal orders have arrived just in time for Spring potting.

Unfortunately, only 50 litre bags were available. These are reasonably priced at \$25 per bag.

Bob Southwell will contact you if you have placed an order to arrange delivery or pick up in the near future. There may be one or two spare bags so contact Bob if you would like to purchase a bag.

13. GROWING MEDIA for ORCHIDS

Are you confused about what material you should grow your orchids in? Here is an article written by Jim Brydie in the Karingal Orchid Society newsletter which he has kindly allowed us to publish.

This is the first part of his article – the second part will be published in the next newsletter.

From what I have seen on my travels, very few orchids grow in pots in nature - orchids grow on trees, on rocks, and in the ground. We put orchids in pots purely for our own convenience, which brings us to the need to provide a medium in the pot. It is impossible to reproduce an orchids natural root environment in a pot or any other way but what we can do, in our artificial growing houses, is to provide a benign root environment with an appropriate balance of air, moisture, and mechanical support. Luckily for us, orchids are very adaptive little devils and most will take to our pot culture without too much fuss.

The balance of air and moisture in the pot seems to be the critical factor. They will all put up with being saturated temporarily when we water them but they need excess water to be shed pretty quickly. As the pot then dries out after watering, the medium needs to provide an airy but moist environment in which the roots can live and thrive. The need for moisture hardly needs explanation but keep in mind that air is an equal necessity. Roots are a living organ of the plant and they have to breathe as they work. In a well-functioning medium, fresh air will be drawn into the pot as the medium dries out and be exchanged evenly throughout the pot. There will be no stale pockets of air.

Different plants require different rates of drying out and it is this that we design into the various mixes we use. Any number of the commonly used potting materials will do the job provided that:

- you get the air/water balance within bounds acceptable to the plant concerned,
- you give the plant regular food and water,
- the mix provides a reasonable pH in which the roots can live and grow.

The latter point is very important. The recommended pH range for orchids is 6.0 to 6.5 as this optimizes the availability of the nutrient elements in the fertilizer you provide. Orchids will of course tolerate a much wider range of pH than this but some kinds of orchids are touchier than others in this regard. In my experience, the roots of some, like Paphiopedilum and some of the Oncidiinae (e.g. those that used to be called Odontoglossum), decline rapidly as the mix ages and I think this is because it gets too acid.

As I said above, many different combinations will serve adequately if other factors are right, but to improve on 'adequate' I think you need to focus on the root system. Roots are the key to maximizing growth. The bigger and more vigorous the root system, the bigger and more robust will be the rest of the plant. Fine tuning the potting medium is the way to maximize root growth and to do that you need options with your potting materials.

When you take your car to a garage for repairs you expect the mechanic to have a full set of whatever tools are necessary for the repair. Why then, do we think we can grow orchids to their potential if we only keep two kinds of bark in the potting shed. For any reasonably sized, mixed orchid collection, the range of environmental needs will be far too wide for any medium to suit all. It is my contention that we need more tools in our shed than that.

There are 4 basic potting medium components that I recommend you keep on hand. These are bark, sphagnum moss, perlite (with peat moss or cocopeat), and coconut fibre. Each has different characteristics and its own strengths and weaknesses. There are a range of other materials that are useful, such as styrene foam, pebbles, sand, etc) but I consider these fringe additives as opposed to major components and I am sure you can succeed without them.

The challenge in a mixed collection is that the plants are usually all jammed together. Watering often takes place for all at the same time regardless of the needs of some plants for different moisture requirements and different drying times. Some differences can be accommodated through choice of microclimates in your growing area. e.g. hanging plants higher, placing them in the bright end versus the shady end, or nearer the fan etc, but beyond that, adjusting the potting medium gives us a mechanism that can have a multiplier effect on microclimate differences.
