3. EDITORIAL:

Why belong to an Orchid Society?

To many it is a chance to show off their prize plants at monthly competitions and one or more annual Shows. To the rest of us we enjoy being able to look at these awesome plants and dream that one day we also will be able to grow them just as well.

Societies also are a source of information on how to improve your growing technique, what orchids should I grow, how to control that mystery leaf spot that has appeared overnight, etc. Orchid Societies have many experienced growers who are always willing to assist others in growing better plants. Monthly guest speakers, regular newsletters, workshops, and demonstrations all provide an opportunity to learn something new and make us all better growers. Active Facebook pages and modern Society websites also act as a source of information and interaction between members.

When you join a local Orchid Society you also become affiliated with the State group (OSNSW) and the Australian Orchid Council (AOC). This allows you to participate in all shows, competitions, conferences, etc, conducted by local orchid societies and those run by the State and National organisations. It also provides you with an opportunity to have your orchids assessed for State and National awards. These State and National organisations also provide qualified Judges to preside at all orchid Shows conducted throughout the year. Both these organisations have active websites which provides lots of useful information on orchid topics.

The local Society also pays a proportion of your membership fee to the Orchid Society of NSW to cover insurance for when you are taking part in Society activities. Other Society funds are also used to cover meeting room rental, printing costs, competition prizes, postage, post box rental, annual Show costs and a host of other items which help the society run smoothly and support the membership.

All of these items listed above make you, as a Society member, better educated as an orchid grower, provide opportunities you would not otherwise have outside a Society and allow you to enjoy the company of other orchid loving people.

Well worth the price of annual membership.

7.BARK SALES:

We have sold all of the current supply of Orchiata Bark but the good news is that new stock will have arrived by the time you receive this newsletter.

This year we have again combined with Woolgoolga and Grafton Orchid Societies so we can get a good deal and then pass the savings onto members.

We will now stock four different grades of bark:

- * Classic 6 to 9 mm
- * Power 9 to 12 mm
- * Power Plus 12 to 18 mm
- * Super 18 to 25 mm

This will allow members to use the correct size bark for the plant they are potting. While there are some exceptions with some orchid types, in general terms a small plant usually means a small pot and small sized potting media (small bark, small perlite, small charcoal, etc).

The Classic bark is ideal for seedlings and small plants while the Super could be what you need for large Vanda's and Cattleya's. Some growers blend some of these mixtures to achieve a mix that suits their orchids and growing conditions. Unfortunately, there has been a price increase of two dollars per bag with this new shipment. Each Society makes very little from the sale of each bag and the aim is to provide members with quality potting mix at a reasonable price. We will sell these bags for \$27 each.

There are only limited supplies of the small and largest sizes so get in early if you need these new sizes.

8. GROWING COMPETITION:

There are still two active growing competitions taking place – the mounted *Dendrobium* and the potted *Sarcochilus*. Keep watering and fertilizing these plants at the same time as you do the rest of your collection. The next judging of these will take place as soon as normal meetings resume. In the meantime, don't forget the Sarcochilus Growing competition taking place on the CHOS Facebook page during the first week of each month. Check it out anytime and take part from the 1st of August. All you need to do it take a current photo of your Sarco, making sure the number is clearly visible, and post it on the Facebook site. Good luck to everyone.

9. ORCHID PROFILES – Vandaceous

A very extensive and popular orchid group usually requiring warmer conditions. This alliance is made up of warm and full-sun growing orchids with colourful flowers that originate in tropical Asia. Commonly hung in baskets with very coarse potting mix, how coarse depends on the size of the plant. Many are suitable for pots with coarse, quick draining potting mix. The larger Vanda's grow best in baskets where their roots can hang free. Vandaceous orchids often develop extensive aerial root systems and care needs to be taken to minimise root damage when moving pots or baskets or when repotting. Water and fertilize regularly during warmer parts of the year when plants are growing rapidly. Vanda's enjoy high humidity and good air movement. Misting on hot days will help increase humidity around the plant. The plants like to be watered well in summer (often every day) but it is best if the roots dry quickly. Water sparingly in winter.

Avoid retention of water in the leaf axils.

Vanda's need high light levels in order to grow and flower properly. They will tolerate full sun if introduced to it slowly but grow best in slightly shaded conditions.

Strap leaf Vanda's need winter protection from cold winds with temperatures best above 10 degrees C.

Many Terete leaved Vanda's (narrow,pencil shaped, rolled leaves) will tolerate lower temperatures for a short period but like most Vanda's they do best in warm, humid conditions.

Vanda's are heavy feeders and need regular fertilizing with a weak strength fertilizer.

The difference between a well grown and a poor plant is usually due to proper watering and fertilizing.
