#### (2) MONTHLY MEETINGS:

Dick Cooper spoke at the well-attended April meeting on the classification and culture of Hard Cane Dendrobiums. Dick outlined the major types of hard cane orchids, the features to look for when purchasing a quality hard cane orchid and the methods that he uses to produce show quality orchids. A summary of the cultural methods adopted by Dick is published later in this newsletter.



During the April meeting, Dick, in his role as Mid North Coast Judging Panel Leader, presented Malcom Ide with two awards – a First Class Certificate (FCC) and an Award of Cultural Excellence (ACE) for Malcolm's superb *Dendrobium* Calico Twist 'Mandy Lee' FCC/AOC. Both these awards are the highest obtainable for merit and cultural categories. Congratulations to Malcolm for both these achievements.



Once again at the May meeting, we will NOT have the usual monthly flowering orchid competition as there is not enough space to erect tables within the room and still maintain social distancing. Instead, we request that each member bring ONE flowering orchid for 'Orchid of the Night' display. These will be placed on tables at the front of the Display Room and not in the breezeway. These orchids will be judged by two qualified judges to determine the best orchid. Orchids should be benched by 7.15pm and judging will commence at 7.20pm.

The Committee is considering returning to full competition, supper and use of the library and name tags from the 3<sup>rd</sup> June meeting.

Members are also asked to bring their Sarcochilus Growing Competition plant to the May meeting for judging. A table will be provided at the front of the Display Room and the plants will be judged on the night. Remember you gain one point by bringing your plant, the best on the night receives an extra two points and second best gains one extra point.

We will continue judging your Sarco plants each month and try to finalise this competition in September this year. We plan to commence a new Growing Competition in Spring this year. More details in future newsletters.

Once again there are a number of Covid-19 rules that we all need to follow so we comply with Government Regulations. These Covid-19 rules are:

- Members to enter through the metal security gates. Do not use the side door. Maintain Social Distancing if there are other members present.
- Use the Hand Sanitiser supplied.
- Each member to sign in with name and contact phone number.
- If you have bought an orchid then place it on the tables provided inside the Display Room.
- Name tags will not be used and library books will not be available for borrowing.
- Seats will be positioned 1.5 metres apart. Family members, and those that have travelled together, may sit closer together but all others are to maintain the 1.5m distance. Members are asked not to stand around taking but to stay seated wherever possible.

- We ask that you wipe over your seat at the end of the meeting. Antiseptic wipes will be provided for this purpose.

#### 4. MINUTES OF APRIL GENERAL MEETING AT NCR BOTANIC GARDENS – 1st APRIL, 2021:

- **1. Welcome:** Carole Davis opened the meeting at 7:34pm and welcomed everyone including three guests; Brenda from Woolgoolga, Tony from Coffs, and Mark from Glenreagh. She asked for apologies and commented on the COVID-19 restrictions and meeting requirements.
- **2. Apologies:** Noelene Jackson, Yuli Dwi, Neville Anderson, Hazel Earnshaw, Dianne Evans, and June Kinnear.
- **3. Minutes of March 2021 meeting:** Moved by Paige Sinclair, seconded by Judith Whiting that the Minutes are a true and accurate record of the proceedings. Carried.
- **4. Correspondence**: Paige Sinclair listed two items: BCU Cheque Book and a Bank statement. She moved that all the correspondence be accepted as presented, seconded by Helena Axelsson. Carried.
- **5. Facebook Report:** Paige Sinclair spoke about the number of likes/followers on the CHOS Facebook page, noting that since February 2020 we had tripled the number from 33 to 101 people.
- **6. Finance:** Bruce addressed the members present summarising the Society's financial position from 15<sup>th</sup> February, 2021 to 14<sup>th</sup> March, 2021. He reported that income for the period was as follows: Membership \$160.00, Raffle Sales \$90.20, Bark \$27.00 and Sponsorship \$100.00, which totalled \$377.20. Expenditure totalled \$75.00 for the show posters. Current balance in the Society's account is \$7,337.24. Moved Bruce Hall, seconded by Ann Deans, Carried. Bruce Hall outlined the new cheque book procedures.
- **7. Membership Fees:** Due by May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2021
  - (a) New Members: No new members
- **8. Sponsors Spot: Ludo Collectables:** Carole Davis had recently been to his shop in Ulmarra. She informed the group that he stocked collectables and antiques, and often bought deceased estate goods. She asked that if you are in his area that you stop in and say 'Hi'.
- 9. Award Presentation: Dick Cooper was pleased to present a number of awards to Malcolm Ide for his Dendrobium Calico Twist. A 'First Class Certificate' (FCC) (which is the highest award given) from both the Orchid Society of NSW and the Australian Orchid Council. Additionally, he presented Malcolm with a 'Cultural Award of Excellence' for doubling the number of spikes in flower on his plant, and the same plant won 'Hybrid of the Year'.
- **10. Orchid of the Night:** Dick Cooper and Bruce Hall judged the plants on the table and awarded Malcolm Ide first place for *Cattleya* Deception Drop and second place went to Carole Davis for her *Prosthecea cochleata*.
- **11. Raffle plants** the winners were Rhonda Smith, Judith Whiting, Frank Pappalardo, and Bob Southwell.

- **12. Sarcochilus Growing Competition:** April 2021 was the first month the Sarcochilius plants were tabled. Paige Sinclair was awarded 1<sup>st</sup> place with three points, and Peter Baker was 2<sup>nd</sup> and picked up two points, all other plants tabled received one point.
- **13.** Sarcochilus Growing Competition on Facebook Paige Sinclair announced the top three plants on the fun Facebook competition 1<sup>st</sup> place Helena Axelsson, 2<sup>nd</sup> place Paige Sinclair, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place Tim Deans.
- **14. Presentation of prizes for the Mounted Growing Competition:** Bob Southwell presented first place to Ann Dean, second place and first flowering went to Peter Baker.

New stock just arrived. Get in early and finish your potting before the cooler weather sets in. Remember, in general terms, most orchids should be repotted every two years but some, such as Phalaenopsis, respond well to repotting every year. Bob can often deliver to your house. Give him a call this week.

#### 9. AUTUMN SHOW



#### 12. HOW I GROW HARDCANE DENDROBIUMS


To grow Hardcane Dendrobiums (Phalaenanthe, Intermediate or Spatulata Dendrobiums) in the Coffs area, most of the year you need a roof over them - especially from late Autumn until Spring and during any long, rain periods. Low temperatures (below 15°C), low light, frequent rain periods and/or poor air circulation can all cause leaves to drop; plants may even die. In addition, if they remain wet and cold, they can be prone to fungal attack (root and bulb rot).



I only grow Phalaenanthe and Intermediate Dendrobiums. My Phalaenanthes grow in a small hothouse all year. It houses around 60 Phalaenanthe plants along with a dozen or so *Den. bigibbum* and *Den. affine*. The temperature is held between 15°C and 32°C. I usually have some Phalaenanthes in flower throughout the year but they are reluctant flowerers if something in their culture does not suit them. In such cases, it is likely they are too dry and/or too cold. Intermediate Dendrobiums cope OK with cooler weather. Mine are in the shade house. Spatulata (Antelope) types have similar requirements but need extra light and feed.



Good air movement is important. Small Phalaenanthe Dendrobiums can be hung to help with the airflow. I can't hang larger plants, so for airflow, I have 3 fans circulating 24 hours a day every day of the year. These consume about 90 watts/hr - solar power halves the overall cost. Air movement is a key need through the cooler months to help keep the canes and potting mix drier and it helps flowering as well as disease control.



From 1 May until mid-August, my hothouse is heated at night (consumes 50 watts/hr); the hothouse has 2 roof-top air vents (1 is automatic) so it cannot get too hot. An automatic sprinkler system runs for 6 minutes at 8AM every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. This is straight Coffs tap water. I allow intervals between watering because the plants only need to remain moist between watering's and this reduces the potential for fungal or bacterial diseases. Watering is reduced to twice a week during June-July because the diurnal temperature is generally lower - less drying occurs. Differences of 15°C between day and night temperatures are tolerated but these plants don't like to be overly dry. To provide constant humidity, plants on the lower bench sit in beds containing 50mm of wet gravel.

I fertilise weekly - usually Sunday mornings: Saturdays (when I have other commitments). I use Merrifert (similar to Campbell's Yellow) at 5 gms/9 litres. Whenever I fertilize, I lower the pH of the water to around 6.2. I do add other chemical fertilizers to suit my feeding program. I also fertilise on Wednesdays following the appearance of new leads and roots, i.e., from late Nov/mid-Dec until mid-March. Most plants flower in autumn off the new growths so they need more food to encourage strong pseudobulb growth and flowers. When in this period of active growth (during Summer and early Autumn), plants also need ample water.

Slight drops in night time temperatures can initiate flowering at other times so I can have flowers at any time of year. Dendrobiums need to make an extensive root system in clean media and receive as much nutrient as possible to make large healthy bulbs. If this can be achieved, they flower readily.

Once canes start to significantly elongate and/or grow side shoots, I space plants (about 1 pot space between). Canes do need to be staked as they grow taller. I do this in early February when the first signs of flower spikes occur. It will then take 2 - 3 months for the flowers to fully open. Grown well, each spike will produce 10 - 20 large flowers (often 80+ mm wide). I aim to encourage multiple actively growing inflorescences, which result in more flowers per plant.

Potting - I prefer deeper pots. I put gravel in the bottom (to discourage benched plants from falling over). When they flower, Phalaenanthe Dens often become top heavy - the extra stone helps to stabilise the pots.

My mix is mainly medium bark and charcoal (2/3 bark, 1/3 charcoal) to which I add more gravel and polystyrene. The gravel, polystyrene and charcoal keep the mix open if the bark breaks down too soon. I aim to change the mix every 2-3 years - the gravel and polystyrene additives provide a bit of a safety margin. Phalaenanthe and Intermediate Dendrobiums should always be confined in their pots - do not overpot!

These orchids grow when the wet monsoonal weather is approaching, so I try to repot just as the plants are coming out of dormancy – this starts when new roots appear from early Summer (mostly). If repotting is delayed too long the roots can be damaged or break off which is not helpful in the lead up to the flowering season.

When potting/repotting I mainly pot-on - trying not to disturb each plant too much. I never divide plants just for the sake of splitting them up though eventually, of course, plants get to a stage where you have no option but to divide them to remain manageable. Some plants mope after repotting – showing virtually no sign of growth for 1 or 2 years after being disturbed.

After a period, I do trim older back canes off having given them the opportunity to show signs of keikis. If any have new keikis emerging, I leave those canes. I prefer to only pot keikis that have a 2<sup>nd</sup> lead - this takes time. I then repot these plants using fine bark and fine charcoal. Each potted keiki is sprayed with Auxinone (a root hormone).

Pest & Disease Control - I have very few problems with most Hardcanes however I do spray for Cercospora (a leaf fungi), apply Phosacid to the pots regularly (to discourage root rots), very occasionally have to remove Boisduval Scale and Dendrobium Beetles (which like all orchid flowers) and I find that spider mites will attack the leaves if kept too dry. *Dendrobium* Sonia is one plant that is reportedly susceptible to health issues - I purposely do not grow it.
