(2) EDITORIAL:

Every Society or Community Group does not get the opportunity to celebrate fifty years since their inception. For the Coffs Harbour Orchid Society that honour occurs this year and the 50th Anniversary celebrations have been set down for Saturday, 16th October, 2021. The Society did exist prior to 1971 but it was a part of the Coffs Harbour Horticultural Society and it wasn't until 1971 that it became a separate organisation.

We have booked Opal Cove for a luncheon event, engaged a Guest Speaker and planned a number of activities to occur throughout the event.

Entry to the luncheon will be by tickets purchased prior to the event. These are being subsidised by the Society and will go on sale during July at \$25 per person. Spouses and partners are welcome to attend the event. More details are given later in this newsletter and more information will be available in future editions.

I would now like to talk about a topic which many members prefer not to think about or make any plans to address. We often hear of members who have passed away and the remaining family has the complicated issue of disposing of the members orchids, hardware, greenhouse, reference material, etc. In many cases the family leaves the plants where they are, almost as if they don't want to disturb their recently passed loved-ones lifetime work. Perhaps they add some water occasionally or make sure the automatic watering system continues to operate. Over time these orchids will require regular fertilizing, they must be checked and treated for diseases and pests, they may need to be divided and they will certainly need repotting in the future. If these basic tasks are not carried out then the neglected orchids will gradually deteriorate and will be of little value to anyone.

Local orchid nurserymen such as Hans Schaible and Ray Clement have often made me aware of this situation. Eventually the family will decide they need help to do something with the remaining orchids and they contact a local nursery, or the local Orchid Society or they have a Garage Sale for the plants. By this time the plants are not in good condition, many are diseased and unattractive to buyers.

On a number of occasions members of the public have contacted me two or three years after the orchid grower had died and asked for advice on what to do and would the Society be interested in buying some orchids or even just take them off their hands. In the majority of cases the plants were beyond being reclaimed and I have always thought it was such a pity to see these once magnificent plants go to waste and how disappointed the deceased orchid enthusiast would be if he or she could see the state their plants were now in.

The solution is to think ahead and be prepared for such an event. Death is sometime predictable and so arrangements can be made while the plants are still in a presentable state. However, in many cases death is unexpected and family members don't know what to do or don't want to face the task of disposal of their loved one's favourite plants or their grief is such that they don't want to part with the beloved plants.

All members should make an effort to address this issue. Discuss it with your closest family members and perhaps come up with an Action Plan should the worse scenario occur. You could bequeath them to your friends; you could donate them to a local orchid society and you could contact a local orchid nursery who more than likely will be very interested in purchasing plants in good condition. Leave the plants for six to twelve months and these organisations may no longer be able to assist you. The other situation that often occurs is that some members may become terminally ill and so they are unable to care for their orchids between their diagnosis of their illness and their passing. Their orchids suffer from a lack of attention and TLC and their value decreases rapidly. Here again, if there was a plan in place, the orchids could be disposed of early and retain some reasonable value to those who received or purchased them.

Hope to see you take part in the Society visit to Tinonee Orchid Nursery Open Day on Saturday, 3rd July. This is the last Tinonee Open Day and should be a memorable event. See you at Tinonee.

And remember "You Can Never Have Enough Orchids"!

5. COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT:


The June Committee Meeting was held on 8th June, 2021.

If you are interested in going to the Tinonee Orchid Workshop on the 3rd of July, please RVSP to me before the end of June 2021. Details are below.



11. A SELECTION OF ORCHIDS THAT RECENTLY CAUGHT MY EYE

I am not a regular Facebook viewer but recently I looked at the CHOS What's in Bloom Facebook page. If you want to see what CHOS members have in flower at any time, this is certainly a great place to check out.

Here are some of the beautiful orchids that caught my eye on the CHOS Facebook page last time I looked.

John Cornale posted a huge number of photos displaying the entrants in the Autumn Nambucca Valley OS show. A couple of John's photos were of 2 different plants of *Brassocatanthe* (*Bct.*) Little Mermaid 'Janet' AM/AOS. These are mericlones of the original awarded plant (the AM being granted by the American Orchid Society). As well as the orchids presented in John's post, Paige Sinclair posted her *Bct*. Little Mermaid 'Janet' AM/AOS. As the photos below show, these are strikingly different plants despite being copies of the same orchid.







The difference in the first two plants is largely because they were grown under differing light conditions. The light has altered the flower colour. The first plant has been grown in higher light than the second one. The first one is similar to photos of the originally awarded plant.

Although Paige's flower has been influenced by its light situation, the most striking feature (to me) is the volume of spotting of the whole flower. I can detect a few spots on the petals of the middle (dark) flower while those on the petals of the first plant are more obvious, But, ignoring the damage markings on Paige's plant, it is heavily spotted by comparison with the others and looks quite dissimilar. It also seems to show a strong yellow colour on the inner section of the labellum. I don't think this is caused by the amount of light in which the plant has been grown and I can't explain why the flower on Paige's plant is so unlike the other 2 Little Mermaids. I also looked at ~20 other Little Mermaids and most are comparable to the first 2 plants

though a few had more pinkish tones like the flower on Paige's plant. My own plant is yet to flower but I will be happy if it turns out like any one of these.

Paige also posted a stunning *Vanda* (*V*.) Pachara Delight 'Blue'. The parents of this are *V*. Karulea x *V*. Gordon Dillon, both of which have the species *V*. *coerulea* in their background. The shape of Pachara Delight is comparable with this species and, as its' name indicates, *V*. *coerulea*, has blue flowers, though not as dark as the photographed flower which is influenced by other species in the breeding.





Neville Anderson has mentioned at some meetings that

V. coerulea and any Vandaceous hybrids bred from this species are well suited to the climate of the Coffs Coast. These plants like high light, a temperature range comparable to the typical Coffs climate and lots of water during late Spring and Summer. If you purchase one, you can expect to have as many as 10-13 large flowers. By large, I mean around 10 cm.

In another post, Carole Davis asked if anyone knew the correct name of this Vandaceous hybrid. Carole thought the name was Meur L Velthuis x Hil Sky Pink Delight but Google had been no help to identifying the name for her.

To ID orchids I do not recommend relying on a direct search of Google (much information is out-of-date, some is inaccurate or plain wrong). If using the internet, it is better to access the RHS registered orchid hybrid or species websites which are constantly kept up-to-date by professionals. In any case, Carole's name was not accurate making it hard for Google or even the RHS sites to find it. Using the program Orchidwiz (a copy of which is held by CHOS), I was able to advise Carole that her plant was an unregistered hybrid with the name *Papilionanda* Merv. L. Velthuis x Hilo Sky 'Pink Delight'. *Papilionanda* can be abbreviated as *Pda*.

As I mentioned in articles I wrote last year about orchid names, clonal names are always contained within single inverted commas, meaning that 'Pink Delight' is a clonal name. Similarly, 'Janet' is the clonal name for the *Bct*. Little Mermaid plants and 'Blue' is the clonal name for the *V*. Pachara Delight discussed earlier.

As a suggestion to newer growers, it is a good idea to keep a record of all your orchids. The simplest way is to use an exercise book though some people maintain a record on their mobile phones. There are apps that facilitate this. Then whenever you buy a plant, add it to your records. If you are really keen, you can put a small numbered label in each pot that cross-references the pot/plant to your records.

Finally, people may know that I grow several *Dendrobium bigibbum*. I use to think I should be able to grow them better: now I know I should! On 9 March, Noelene Jackson posted an awesome *Den. bigibbum* var. *compactum*. I counted 65 flowers and 22 buds and I am certain I missed quite a few. Well done, Noelene - I, for one, am envious.



(12) HOW MUCH RAIN IS TOO MUCH?

Between the start of December 2020 and now, we've had a lot of rain. In fact, at my home I recorded 1.76 metres of the stuff. Don't get me wrong, rain is good but rain combined with overcast conditions, lots of humidity and fluctuating temperatures, can upset the usual growing season for orchids. The result is that some plants flower early, others are slow to flower. I suspect that a good number of local growers had similar experiences because the orchid shows I have attended had fewer plants benched and the overall quality was down too.

One thing I experienced at that time was an increase in the major pests - a consequence of the extended warm and humid conditions. Such circumstances can also attract bacterial rots and fungal issues as well other pests. How to deal with them?

If your shade house/growing area is exposed to the elements or if you are having trouble with rots or root fungi, try the following. Repot plants into smaller pots, ie. if you have an orchid in a 175 ml pot, see if you can fit it into 150ml pot. Smaller is good: squat pots are often better. Use a fresh mix. Avoid or minimise any materials intended at assisting bottom drainage - good air and good ventilation through the media is needed now. Remove any dead or dying roots and give plants a drench with AUXINONE® at 1.5ml per litre. This is a root promotant (or a similar root promotant). Drench again about every ten days until new roots appear. Also keep plants under 50% shade. Avoid fertilising until about 6 weeks after new roots appear, then use Campbell's Yellow or similar at one teaspoon/9 litre watering, about every 3 to 4 weeks.

If the plants can't be 'potted down', then you should still consider repotting in fresh mix, removing dead or dying roots, to provide better ventilation and air circulation within the media.

If plants are in good condition, with no sign or rot, fungal issues or dead/dying roots, then continue your normal cultural program.

If you are a new grower, do not use different mixes - unless you want problems! And, don't be heavy handed with the fertiliser - if using Campbell's Yellow as your main fertiliser, apply at a limit of 5 grams/9 litre.

What should new growers start off with?

Here are some suggestions:

- 1) CAMPBELLS YELLOW fertiliser this will give you enough nutrients;
- 2) a small pack of MANCOZEB (a fungicide for the leaves);
- 3) a small bottle of PHOSACID (or ANTI ROT) a fungicide for root rots;
- 4) a small bottle of a wetting agent;
- 5) a small pack of MAGNESIUM SULPHATE (Epsom Salts); and
- 6) some CALCIUM NITRATE.

Most of these products are available from Bunnings or other hardware stores. <u>It is best not to mix products</u>. The fertilizers in 1), 5) and 6) are available through WDOS who have a general blended fertiliser consisting of Campbell's Yellow and Magnesium Sulphate.

If using Magnesium Sulphate separately, apply at 2-2.25 gram/9 litre container. Limit Calcium Nitrate to once/month at 10-15 grams/9 litres. Cymbidiums will accept higher nitrogen fertilisers but don't use them on other orchids.

Always use good quality orchid bark. I recommend adding charcoal; some people also use perlite. WDOS, CHOS and Nambucca Valley OS all sell good bark. WDOS also sells charcoal and perlite.

13. CHOS 50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

This year marks fifty years since the Coffs Harbour Orchid Society separated from the Coffs Horticultural Society in 1971 and became a stand-alone organisation.

We plan to mark this event with a luncheon at Opal Cove Resort on Saturday, 16th October, 2021. Tickets will be subsidised by the Society and priced at \$25 each per person. Spouses and Partners are welcome to attend at the subsidised price. The tickets have now been printed and will be available for purchase from the 15th July meeting. Each ticket is numbered and a Lucky Door Draw will occur during the luncheon. It is expected that the tickets will sell quickly so you should purchase yours early.

Highly qualified orchid judge and experienced grower, Jody Cutajar, has agreed to be the guest speaker at the luncheon event. Jody will present an illustrated talk on the Orchids of Brazil.

More details of the 50th Anniversary will be provided in future editions of the newsletter and on our website.

14. BUNNINGS FUND RAISING BBQ:

Money is a constant need for any Society that wishes to do things for their membership. There are many ongoing running costs that need to be covered in a twelve month period in the life of a Society. Raffles, Membership Fees, Donations and plant sales cover many of these but events such as the Bunnings Sausage Fund Raising Events are major ones in the life of this Society.
