

# **November Monthly Meeting:**

The November Meeting is set down for Thursday 4th and will once again be held in the Uniting Church on the corner of Vernon and Gordon Streets, Coffs Harbour. Covid-19 restrictions will apply and all members are asked to sit in the allocated seating and only sit closer together if you live together, etc. All in attendance must wear a mask, use hand sanitiser and sign in using the QR Code, etc.

The usual monthly flowering orchid competition will take place so please bring along orchids for competition and other members enjoyment.

Members are also asked to bring a contribution for supper to be held later in the meeting.

The November meeting will include the AGM and an illustrated talk given by our own Australian Bird Expert, Dick Cooper.

#### AGM and 2022 Committee Nominations:

The 2021 AGM will take place before the General Monthly Meeting on Thursday, 4th November. This will include the financial reports for 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 and the election of your Committee for 2022. Nominations are now being called for all positions on the Committee (Four Executive and three Committee positions). These nominations will close with the Secretary on the evening of 28th October, 2021. If you would like to join the Committee, or know of someone who would, then please complete a nomination form. Nomination forms will be available from the Secretary or can be downloaded from the Website.

# 2022 Plant Growing Competition:

We will start a new competition in November and this will run through 2022. This new competition will be based on a hybrid Epidendrum grown by Scott Barrie from Barrita Orchids.

The selected clone is <u>Epidendrum Princess Valley 'Blushing'</u>. Each plant will be sold to members for \$10 each (one plant per member). It is recommended that all members take the opportunity

to purchase one of these plants for their collection even if they prefer not to be part in the on-going competition. We have ordered forty (40) plants and we have all ready sold over thirty, so if you would like to secure a plant then please contact Paige or Bob in the next few days. You can pay for the plant at the November meeting. A draw will be made during the meeting to fairly allocate plants to all members. The first judging will take place at the February meeting in 2022. If you already have one in your collection then you probably have some experience in successfully growing this type of orchid. Why not buy a new one



and demonstrate your skill by taking part in the Growing Competition?

We will provide each member with a Growing Guide to help you successfully grow this Epidendrum. Some members have felt it may be difficult to grow this plant but as it is a shortened version of the standard Crucifix Orchid (tough and difficult to kill) and thrives in Cattleya type conditions, it is expected that all members will have little difficulty in achieving a good result with this plant.

# December Meeting and Award, Presentation Night:

Instead of a formal night meeting we have decided (following your suggestions in the recent survey) to hold a Christmas Luncheon at the Green House Tavern, Coffs Harbour on Saturday 4th December, 2021. The luncheon will commence at 12 noon and names will be taken by Paige or any member of the Committee from when you receive this newsletter. It is essential that you book your place (plus your partner) so we are able to cater for the correct numbers attending.

The Society will subsidise members and their partners by reducing the cost of the lunch by \$10 per person. A \$5 drink voucher will also be given to each attendee so they can obtain a drink at the bar (if the drink costs more than \$5 then you pay the extra).

The Green House Tavern will have a select menu from which to order and you can order either a Two Course Meal for \$35 (less the \$10 subsidy) or a Three Course Meal for \$45 (less the \$10 subsidy).

A limited amount of awards and prizes will be presented on the day. As we have only been able to stage three full Monthly Plant Competitions during 2021 (August, October and November – you may recall that for the other meetings early in the year we only had "Orchid of the Night" where each member brought only



brought one plant to the meeting), the Committee has decided to add this years three competitions onto those proposed for each month in 2022. This means there will be no competition awards at the Christmas Luncheon. Each member is asked to bring one orchid to the Christmas Luncheon and we will organise a Popular Vote Competition with small prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

# Postponements:

**The Woolgoolda District Orchid Society Workshop** has been postponed until 13th Novemnber, 2022. Many of the proposed speakers come from Queensland or Greater Sydney and so are unable to attend this year due to Covid-19 restrictions. It is hoped to have a similar speaker line-up in 2022.

**Rosella Orchid Nursery** at South Grafton had planned for a weekend Open Day and Workshop during the Jacaranda Festival at the end of October and early November. This has now been postponed until 2022. The Society had planned a members visit on the Open Day and it is hoped to do something similar next year.

Australian Orchid Conference: In 2019, South East Queensland Orchid Societies combined to bid for the 2021 event and won the right to hold the 2021 AOC Conference and Show in South East Queensland. *Due to COVID-19, the event has been postponed until 2022.* The event will be held at the Logan Sports and Events Centre from 31 August to 4 September 2022. Some CHOS members will be attending in 2022 as it is only at the top end of the Gold Coast. It usually attracts many of the Worlds best orchid speakers and is an event not to be missed.

# 6. **COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT, OCTOBER, 2021:**

The October Committee Meeting was held at 6 Sunrise Drive, Boambee East on 12 October, 2021.

Topics discussed included:

#### 7. GUEST SPEAKER AT NOVEMBER MEETING:

Most of us are familiar with Dick Cooper as an experienced orchid grower and judge. Many would be aware that he has been growing orchids for over thirty years and is the Leader of the Mid North Coast Judging Panel.

But Dick wears another hat! For the past fifty years he has been an avid bird watcher and has been heavily involved in the welfare of our native birds, preservation of their habitat and in recent years he has been involved in mapping the distribution of native birds, especially in NSW. He ,and some colleagues ,have produced 'The NSW Bird Atlas' and are now up to volume 3 of this publication. In 2019 Dick received the J. N. Hobbs Medal. This a national award presented for outstanding contribution to Australasian ornithology by an amateur ornithologist.

We are privileged that Dick has agreed to present an illustrated talk on Australian Birds following the AGM on 4th November. As well as showing photographs of the major Australian bird groups, Dick will highlight the loss of habitat that is causing concern and outline the major migration routes for birds that visit this area.



# 10. BASIC TIPS FOR REPOTTING ORCHIDS:

Don't be afraid to re-pot your orchid. Despite their reputation, orchids are tough and repotting helps them to thrive. When buying orchids, it is always wise to inspect the mix and the pot that the plant is in. Sometimes the mix is old and the pot does not suit the plant size or offers little or no drainage; if this is the case then re-pot them soon after getting them. Most orchids require re-potting every two years although there are exceptions to this rule.

Re-pot the orchid when it finishes flowering into fresh orchid mix, this gives them the best chance at a successful growth phase and the flowering phase that follows. Try to avoid repotting in winter when it is cold. Most mixes break down over time and can smother the orchid as they need oxygen at their roots. The freshness and quality of the orchid mix is an essential component to successful growth and flowering.

#### **SELECT THE CORRECT ORCHID MIX**

The phrase potting material isn't just a fancy way of saying dirt. Generic potting materials can consist of gravel, dried plant fibres, bark and more. You won't find potting soil in orchid mixes, because most orchids have roots that need more air space than soil can provide. Orchids also need potting material that drains rapidly and at the same time retains some moisture. Because orchids usually go at least two years, and many times longer, between re-potting, they also need materials that are slow to decompose. Don't be fooled by generic orchid mixes sold at hardware stores. When it comes to orchid mixes, quality and freshness really matter. Once you see the difference a fresh mix made from the highest quality ingredients makes compared to store brands you won't ever want to go back to those inferior mixes again. Choose a potting mix that suits your particular type of orchid and one that you feel comfortable with, no single potting material works best for every orchid or orchid grower. The most commonly used potting media is a mixture of orchid bark, perlite and charcoal. Sphagnum moss can be used with great success on small orchids and orchids that are in a poor condition. Sphagnum moss however does require product knowledge for its use. Once you have selected the correct orchid mix for your orchid place the required amount into a bucket of clean water and add a generous amount of seaweed extract which is a tonic – not a fertiliser. You can also add a fungicide to the water such as Chlortan.

#### **PREPARATION**

When re-potting and handling potting mediums light weight gloves should be worn for protection against any micro-organisms that may be present in the mixes. The medium should be thoroughly saturated. If you are using a clay or wooden pot soak it as well. A dry mix and/or pot will draw moisture from the plant and may cause stress and damage to the plant. Sharp scissors will be required.

Always sterilise tools before and after each use as you could transfer diseases from plant to plant. Orchid Den recommends keeping the tools in a solution of trisodium phosphate, this is a non-corrosive, heavy duty steriliser. Remove any wire plant-tie and stakes that may be anchoring your plant. Remove the plant's label and place it to one side where it won't get lost. If you want to reuse the original pot for another orchid, sterilise it using the trisodium phosphate solution.

#### REMOVE THE ORCHID FROM THE POT

Soak the orchid and the pot in a bucket of water for a couple of hours then place the side of the pot against the edge of your workbench and roll the pot from side to side, pressing downward against it as you roll. This will loosen the roots and bark.

You should now be able to remove the plant without much effort. If the plant still won't come out you may have to cut the plastic pot from top to bottom and peel the pot away from the root mass. If your orchid is planted in a clay pot, its roots are likely to have attached themselves against the sides, making removal difficult, in this case try soaking it for longer.

#### PREPARE THE ORCHID FOR RE-POTTING

When removed from the pot the roots will often be in a tight mass, gently separate the roots. If you cannot separate the roots as they are too compact you may need to cut a few to enable them to be separated. Remove as much of the old mix from between the roots as you can by using a hose or tap. Remove and cut away any dead roots. This is a very important step to ensure your orchid will grow well and not succumb to root rot over the next couple of years. Healthy roots are firm, with a whitish or light brownish covering. Do not feel tempted to give healthy roots a "hair cut". Do not re-use any old mix for your orchids, rather put the discarded material onto a garden bed.

Clear your work surface of old bark and dead roots. If you are re-potting a Cattleya carefully peel the brown sheaths from the pseudobulbs and inspect for insect damage, do not peel the green sheaths from any new growth. Dead bulbs and canes (brown and shriveled) can be removed, but don't remove any green bulbs or canes, even without leaves, as these are storing food for the orchid.

#### **ORCHID ROOTS**

Roots are the basis of any orchid plant. It's very important for your orchid to have a robust root system; the orchid takes in water and nutrients through its roots which in turn allows the whole plant to grow and thrive. Good roots bring good blooms. An orchid can have deceptively beautiful leaves with a <u>root system</u> that is in trouble. Often root trouble is the result of over-watering, under-watering or lack of re-potting.

#### **RE-POT YOUR ORCHID INTO ITS NEW CONTAINER**

Orchid Den's Root Extender contains blended mycorrhiza and other beneficial live fungal spores, essential to the germination and the growth of Orchid Plants and can help promote good root growth especially on Phalaenopsis Orchids. It is important that you select the correct pot for the type and size of the orchid. Generally orchids prefer to be snug in their pot.

If the roots are healthy, firm, and filling the pot, put the orchid in a pot just one size larger than the one you removed it from. If the roots are rotted and in poor condition, re-pot the plant in a container of the same or one size smaller than it was removed from. If you place a poorly rooted plant in a container that's too large, the growing material will stay too damp, which will result in root rot and loss of the plant. If you are re-potting a Cattleya, position the oldest growth in the division against the side of the pot with the new growth facing the middle. If your orchid is monopodial, with a single main growth from which roots grow (such as a Phalaenopsis or Vanda), position the plant in the centre of the pot so that its roots are more or less spread evenly on every side. Keeping plant and pot stationary with one hand use the other hand to fill the pot with the wet mix and cover the roots and press the mix down firmly into the pot. The orchid should not move independently of the pot when given a gentle shake. If the roots are not long enough (or healthy enough) to give this security, then you need to stake the plant. Push the stake down into the potting medium beside the plant and secure the pseudobulbs or the canes

to the bamboo stake at a level high enough to support your plant, using tie wire, daisy clips or a plastic pseudobulb clip. A rhizome stake can be used for short orchids. If your orchid has very poor roots and they are short in length you can put a piece of polystyrene into the base of the pot and push the bamboo stake into this giving a much more secure base to hold the orchid.

# Re-pot orchids when:

- Orchid roots are overflowing the pot.
- The plant itself is going over the edge of the pot.
- Potting material is getting soggy and drains poorly.
- The orchid is in poor condition.
