1. EDITORIAL:

We are all looking forward to catching up with Society members during the 50th Anniversary Celebrations at Opal Cove Resort on Saturday, 2nd April. To date we have sold about forty tickets which is a little disappointing as we had hoped for fifty or more members to join us for lunch with Jody Cutajar from the Central Coast. Jody will be our guest speaker and will talk about his orchid experiences in Brazil as well as the country and its people. Many members may have delayed their decision to attend until closer to the date. There is only a short time to go until the event so it is essential that you contact Paige Sinclair to reserve a ticket if you wish to join us to celebrate this Society milestone. Full details are outlined elsewhere in this newsletter.

Annually, the Society struggles to encourage members to pay their annual membership fees. These fees are again set at a modest \$10 per annum and \$15 for a family membership. Those under 18 are only asked to pay \$5 per year. Each year the Society pays out just under \$6 per member for insurance to protect members when they are involved in any of the Society's functions such as meetings, workshops and fund raising activities. The membership fee also covers the Society's expenses such as postage, stationery, printing, new members gifts, etc and is never enough to cover the myriad of expenses that need to be paid. While a substantial case can be put as to why membership fees need to be increased, your current Committee has no intention of increasing these fees in the foreseeable future.

There are also many obvious social benefits from belonging to an Orchid Society. Regular meetings provide you with the opportunity to mix with like-minded Orchidophiles, exhibit your flowering orchids and receive cultural advice from guest speakers and experienced members. It also entitles you to exhibit at any orchid show in NSW.

Membership fees are set at each AGM and become due from the date of the AGM in November. It is expected that members will renew their membership within three months of this date which means that dues should be paid by the meeting in early February.




10. Coffs Harbour Orchid Society Facebook (From Paige Sinclair)

12. BITS AND PIECES:

- Growing Competition, 2022: Don't forget to bring your Epidendrum along for judging at the April meeting. Remember to include the numbered tag in the pot. It was great to see so many plants benched at the March meeting.
- Bruce Hall will be the Guest Speaker at the April Monthly Meeting set down for 7th April. Bruce will explain what you need to do so your plants are presentable for the April Autumn Show. Bruce will also go through the various rules and regulations that govern the Show. This will be your opportunity to hear from an expert on what is required of you as a competitor and what you can do to improve your chances at the Show.
- You may have been doing some repotting and found that your labels have faded so they are difficult to read or worst still the label has disintegrated. Perhaps you have heard that the acceptable name of the orchid has changed or it has been pointed out to you that you have a spelling error on the label. Now is the time to fix it. Every few years you should replace the label so you don't have errors occurring in the future. Always buy quality, thick labels. Never purchase those narrow, thin labels from the discount stores. They only last "five minutes". Use a 4B, 5B or 6B pencil or perhaps you prefer a pen with permanent ink (though if you ever treat your plant with methylated spirits it will remove the ink if you spill it on the label).
- The Society has just ordered a new supply of the Orchid Information Pamphlets. This has been extensively checked and updated. The pamphlet provides a summary of the cultural requirements for the main orchid groups. Hardcanes have been added to this edition. Copies will be available at the Autumn Show.
- If you are not sure if you have paid your membership fees for this year then check with Leonie or Paige. Fees are due by the end of April.
- Plants need both Nitrogen and Calcium to grow prolifically. Calcium Nitrate is a very soluble chemical. It easily forms a solution in water so is usually sprayed in a liquid form as a foliar fertilizer. It is recommended that you spray your plants every two or four weeks with a foliar spray. 2 to 4 g of Calcium Nitrate per litre of water. Do not mix any Calcium fertilizer with other chemicals otherwise precipitation will occur in the spray device. Many growers spray the Calcium Nitrate once a month at the rate of 4g/L.
- The high rainfall we have experienced over summer could result in root rot issues among your orchids. Fungal infection in the root systems of orchids reduces the growth of roots and so slows down the growth of leaves and flowers. A precautionary spray of an anti-fungal solution such as Yates Anti-Rot could save your plants. Also a general leaf spray of Trifend will provide protection from leaf fungi, spider mites and insect attack.

13. BARK SUPPLIES FROM CHOS FOR THE CURRENT POTTING SEASON:

The Society stocks 40 litre bags of NZ Orchiata Bark selling at \$27 each and 35 litre bags also selling at \$27 each (Sorry, but there has been a slight price rise). There are four sizes — 6 to 9mm; 9 to 12mm; 12 to 18mm and 18 to 25mm.

15. THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY/SLIMY:

Part 2 The Good - Have you seen a Ladybird without spots?

This is not specifically about orchids but rather a special little garden companion, the ladybird. Whether your passion is totally focused on orchids, or if you are also an avid gardener, Mother Nature provides an array of non-chemical means to help control the nasties in our garden & the ladybird is one such helper. Ladybird beetles belong to family Coccinellidae. Worldwide there are nearly 6,000 species of ladybirds. Whilst there are a few species you don't want in your garden, most of Australia's 500 species of ladybird are beneficial. Both the larvae & adult of beneficial ladybirds feed on aphids, scale, insects & mites - so what orchid lover would not like to see these little cuties frequenting our gardens!

So what piqued my interest in ladybirds? Way back at the onset of the whole coronavirus pandemic, after not being allowed to visit anyone for weeks due to the initial lockdown, I was really happy to be able to visit my brother for the first time in what felt like forever, once the restrictions were lifted. My brother has several crepe myrtles in his back garden which were suffering from a bit of an aphid infestation & we spent the afternoon chatting & exploring the life cycle of the ladybirds that had come to feast. As shown in the left photo, a variety of ladybirds were enjoying the aphid smorgasbord during the afternoon. Apart from photos noted as being from the internet, the rest are from my brother. I am no expert – just an interested observer, so I have used Mr Google to try to identify the different types.*

My brother and I didn't find any intact eggs but the photo to the right, from the *FieldGuide shows the small, yellow, oval eggs of the common spotted ladybird, on the underside of a leaf of an infested plant – dinner (green aphids) would be ready & waiting when the larvae hatch.

When I first went to sit down in the gazebo, my brother asked me to make sure I didn't sit on any of the ladybird larvae – I looked down & they were everywhere! Different types are shown in the photo to the left.

I don't recall specifically seeing these larvae before, if I have, I did not realise what they were. Considering the beautiful form they take as adults, the larvae are really quite intimidating looking little critters. Photo above to the right from the *FieldGuide shows a larvae eliminating pesky aphids. (For a great action shot follow this link https://tekdeeps.com/the-ladybug-larva-an-aphid-eater/

So we had an array of larvae & adults & went searching for the penultimate stage, the pupae. My brother knew where to look, & before long he found a strip of bark (photo to the right) that was providing protection for a selection of different pupae.

Then, for the first time in my life, I saw a plain yellow ladybird – no spots!

I had never seen a ladybird without spots before so I was intrigued. My brother collected little spotless & put him carefully in a container. A few hours later he was spotless no more! A live show - no technology required. Mother nature in action – fascinating! What a transformation, ugly duckling to cute little ladybird - beauty & the beast in one.

Whilst most Aussie ladybirds are beneficial, there are some that are phytophagous i.e. both larvae and adults feed on plants & you don't want these! The 28/26 spotted ladybirds can be up to 1cm in length, light orange & as the highly imaginative name suggests, have 26-28 spots – if they will sit still long enough for you to count. It may be easier to identify them based on whether or not they are decimating the leaves of your plants leaving them with a rather sad looking, shredded, peek-a-boo effect. The colouring on the 28's (bad guys) is similar to the common spotted ladybird (good guy) but the spots on 28 are smaller & the elytra (hard cover over wings) is much less shiny. Another you don't want is the leaf -eating ladybird, it has four large orange-red and four yellow square spots on a dark brown body.

The preferred food of phytophagous ladybirds is from the cabbage, potato & bean families but their favourite plant is the black nightshade, so if you can, remove this weed from your garden you will reduce a reason for them to visit. The four photos below are from the *FieldGuide

However, if you see one like the photo to the left then lucky you, it's known as the *Mealybug Destroyer *Cryptolaemus montrouzieri*, these have been exported to many countries as an effective biocontrol agent.

If you want to attract ladybirds to your garden, plant herbs like coriander, fennel & dill & brightly coloured flowers such as zinnia, sunflower, calendulas & marigolds.
