The winning entries will be placed on the AOF web site and maybe published in Australian orchid periodicals.

April 2022 – Currently, the Coffs Harbour Orchid Society has 268 likes and 300 followers on our Facebook page. This is up by 10 people for the last month.


Three weeks prior to the Autumn Orchid Show we placed an ad on Facebook to let locals know of our upcoming show.

15. PRESIDENTS SPEECH AT THE CHOS 50th ANNIVERSARY LUNCHEON: Saturday 2 April 2022

Hallo my name is Carole Davis – President of the Coffs Harbour Orchid Society, and I would like to welcome everyone to our 50th+1 Anniversary Luncheon - members, guests, friends and some of our Sponsors - Bruce Hall, Ray and Lorraine Clements from Tinonee Orchids, and Jane and Tim from Coffs Harbour Produce. A special welcome to Jody Cutajar our celebrity speaker who I will introduce properly later in the afternoon if that is OK. Our ex-Presidents are a bit light on the ground but we do have one here today – Peter Gough (whose term was at the turn of the century although he is not comfortable with that phrase !), but apologies from Ron Alexander another ex-President and Committee member for many years.

Some other apologies – Michelle Pearce, Dick and Barbara Cooper, Neville Anderson, Bill and Jenny Lennon, Malcolm Ide, Helena Axelsson, Paul Morris, Graham and Lorraine Armstrong, Steven and Felice Fripp, and Ludo Gayko. David Banks (a well-known grower and author) was the Speaker at our 40th and sends greetings. When I spoke to him last month he mentioned he lived in Carole Street (don't know how that came into the conversation) and he also had a Coelogyne Edward Pearce in flower. Ed Pearce was of course our past-President, and renowned Coelogyne tragic.

So why are we here today? The original intention was to celebrate our 50th last year but COVID intervened so this is really 50+1. Some research and anecdotal history indicates that we are actually older but the official Minutes give our inception as 7 April 1971 so we will stick with the written authority – and it was indeed handwritten! To be honest trawling through the history is a bit like starting on a PhD or finding the source of the Mekong Delta – you do a lot of swimming upstream but it is really interesting.

A bit of background, and some of you may recognise these names. A Mr W Bamfield was a large scale grower of orchids in North Boambee and instrumental in the formation of the Horticultural Society in 1950 (which became the Garden Club in 1979) and, together with Mr R Smith from Sawtell, who had been a founding member of the Sydney Orchid Club, they encouraged other locals to take up orchid culture and Coffs gained a reputation for growing more orchids than any other north coast town. Well done us.

As a result there were often more orchid growers than other members of the Horticultural Society at the meetings, and they would form what we might now refer to as a break out group to discuss orchid business, so that in 1964 there was a name change to Horticultural and Orchid Society.

As mentioned earlier, the first Minutes which indicated that our Society became a separate entity were dated 7 April 1971, with a bank balance of \$244 and the President had a casting vote – or tossed a coin! Much more democratic today but things probably take a lot longer to resolve. A Newsletter was started in this year (a roneo-ed version on a gestetner) which this has continued to this day being well served by the Editors who have done much to keep members informed about the Society, and is a mine of information on all aspects of orchid growing. I have a 1982 copy which refers to P Baker – is that you Peter when you won an award? Yes, indeed it is so that is a living part of our history. Now here we have the April 2022 version of our Newsletter. In colour and a bit flashy keeping up with technology.

In 1974 we supported the establishment of the Botanic Gardens and I have here a newspaper clipping of Peter Gough at the opening of the glasshouses which contained orchids, bromeliads, hoyas and similar.

Now jump to 1992 when the Coffs Harbour Orchid Conference was organised in conjunction with the Orchid Society of NSW. This was three years in the planning and coordinated by Sandy Anderson - one of our Life Members. Records indicate 7000 people attended and it was the largest orchid conference of its kind in Australia that year. We had international speakers and judges, and guess who spoke on Native Orchids – Ray Clements! We were also supported by Societies from across Australia and there was a total of \$10,000 in prizes which was not a bad deal back then – so it was not just a little shin-dig.

Full of enthusiasm, in 1993 we started planning for another event, this time in conjunction with Woolgoolga Orchid Society, and in 1995 held an Orchid Festival, again one of the biggest outside of a capital city. Ten Societies participated in another very successful venture and we have a video with some excellent footage of the individual displays. However, the background music does leave a bit to be desired.

Our modern history has nothing quite as spectacular as a Conference or Festival, but there have been a lot of peaks, and in 2010 we launched our website which continues as an entry point for people interested in the Society and/or visitors hoping to catch up on a local orchid meeting, which is often the case. It works well because our Newsletters are uploaded so there is a lot of information and reference material always available.

Workshops were originally initiated by Gordon Clarke and Brian Newman in 2011 for new growers and gained a significant following as they were so hands-on, and I think this has underpinned our own philosophy – keep it simple, seeing is believing, plus provide Fact Sheets.

One thing we have done very well recently has been showing how resilient we are to change, even though subjected to pandemic restrictions which have impacted on our excursions, Workshops, and Shows. Despite the interruptions to our meetings when so many members were unable to show off their plants, we have had great support from those speakers who have been available. The 2021 Autumn Show did actually go ahead and we introduced a *Popular Choice* which proved to be very popular. From memory, the result was quite different to the official judging, but I suspect this is often the case, for example the Archibald Prize. The Spring Show last year was a no-go, and this was really disappointing since we had been running Shows since 1975, but the *Virtual* variation was a great success although the fragrance and impulse to ignore the *Please Do Not Touch* signs were obviously missing.

Our FaceBook presence, through the *What's In Bloom* monthly competition, has enabled members to share their magnificent plants not only within our organisation but to the outside world and that has been a bit of an eye-opener. The *Advisors Program* was ostensibly for new Members but has certainly been embraced by others looking to further their knowledge of some unfamiliar genera. Why not?

Probably best to forget the ZOOM Committee meetings where a priority was to make sure the camera was *not* looking up your nose

We have continued with our Growing Competitions, Plant Auctions, plus the go-to Bunnings Sausage Sizzles, and we also conducted a Survey last year which indicated we are travelling in the right direction. In conjunction with Woolgoolga, we participate in the Coffs Agricultural Show and we put on a pretty good display with more freedom for artistic design than the usual judged Show different plants and enhancements with rocks and the like. It's open to your own interpretation on the day.

Now we have some bragging rights with recent Awards to members.

Bill and Jenny Lennon have received numerous awards over the years, one of the latest being in 2018 with an Award of Merit and Australian Cultural Certificate for their Dendrochillum tenellum – a stunning plant. The highest cultural award given to Australian orchid growers.

Last year, Malcolm Ide's Dendrobium Calico Twist Mandy Lea (FCC/AOC NSW) and he also gained an AM for Stanhopea ruckeri 'Dosky'. At about the same time Hans Schiable received an HCC for Paph Saint Swithin 'Dark Star'. Congratulations— these are great achievements and I apologise if I have missed others.

A slightly different twist was when Helena Axelsson won 2nd prize in a national competition run by the Australian Orchid Foundation for her essay on *Growing Orchids in a Small Space or on a Balcony*. It portrayed an excellent use of vertical space. Well done Helena.

Integral to our history, of course, are all the members (and I emphasise this) who have supported us and contributed in so many ways over the years, indeed some longer than others, including those here today - Peter Baker (38), Betty Pittaway (29), Barbara Pearce (23), and Ron and Judy Cowling (23). To Ron and Judy I apologise it has taken two years to get these Certificates laminated! Blame it on COVID.

Bruce Hall is a Life Member and I have previously mentioned another Life Member Ed Pearce who established a Coelogyne breeding program which we currently manage with some success.

A BIG thank you to all our Sponsors who have continued to support us despite recent pandemic difficulties.
