


8. BARK SUPPLIES FROM CHOS FOR THE CURRENT POTTING SEASON:

12. BITS AND PIECES:

- 1. <u>February Meeting</u>: Thursday, 2nd February, starting at 7.30pm at the Coffs Botanic Gardens. Topic is "Back To Basics—Pots, Potting Mixes and Repotting". We would encourage all our newer members to attend and learn the basics of potting orchids, what is available for your use and some potting mix recipes that work. It will also act as refresher for more experienced members and they will be able to contribute during the evening.
- 2. <u>March Meeting:</u> Thursday 2nd March from 7.30pm. Topic is "Repotting Stanhopeas". Bruce Hall will take us through the process of repotting Stanhopeas after they have flowered. Most growers have an Upside Down Orchid or two and would likely benefit from hearing Bruce's tips on how to care for this orchid group.
- 3. <u>Plant Growing Competition</u>: February marks the end of the 2022 Growing Comp. Bring along your *Epidendrum* for its final judging at the February meeting. Final points will be allocated at the Feb meeting and prizes presented to the winners and runner-ups at the March meeting.
- 4. <u>New Plant Growing Competition for 2023</u>: The plant for this year's Growing Competition is *Vanda falcata* or Japanese Wind Orchid. Forty plants have been ordered and are expected to arrive towards the end of January. All of these plants have almost identical genetics and are a similar size. However, in order to account for any small variations with each plant, an allocation draw will be held during the February Meeting. Each of these plants will be numbered and each member who has paid for a plant will draw a number and this will be matched to the plant with that number. This ensures the allocation process is a fair one. Thirty six plants have been sold and so four plants remain. If you would like to order a plant then please let Bob Southwell or Paige Sinclair know as soon as possible. Only one plant per member and only forty plants are available. Each plant will have a Growing Guide attached. The first judging of this plant will take place during the March meeting.

13. ENVY—ANTI-TRANSPIRTANT AND PLANT PROTECTOR

Many members of the CHOS have used the product Envy as an anti-transpirant when they are deflasking seedlings and spray the seedlings with Envy to slow down water loss from the young leaves. After recent discussion with some experienced growers, I realised that many growers use the product on their fully grown orchids for other purposes, especially to slow down water loss in hot periods or to prevent sunburn. It seems that growers in cooler climates use the product to prevent damage from cold or frosts. It would be useful if we talked to more experienced growers about how they use this product and what results they have achieved.

Envy is sold by the company AgroBest and their website [agrobest.com.au] provides the following information about the product.

Envy is a frost protector and anti-transpirant, which can substantially reduce moisture losses by up to 50%, eliminate sun and windburn damage as well as increase frost tolerance by an additional 4 Degrees.

Envy will not impede plant growth or photosynthesis, is non-toxic, pH neutral and will biodegrade in sunlight.

ENVY PROTECTS PLANTS FROM:

- Excessive moisture loss
- Frost stress
- Guards against Sunburn
- Salt spray & Windburn
- Wilting in hot dry conditions
- Transplanting losses



How Does it Work?

When Envy is applied to a plant, it adheres and forms an invisible semi-permeable membrane over the leaf surface. Even in non-freezing conditions, the Envy bio-shield helps protect plants from environmental-related stresses. The membrane permits the plant to "breathe". As a result it allows oxygen, carbon dioxide, and ethylene gas to pass and at the same time effectively slows down the loss of water and water vapour through transpiration from the leaf surfaces.

By spraying Envy to achieve complete coverage of the plant (on both sides of leaves) the amount of moisture lost through transpiration is reduced by as much as 50%.

Frost Protection: It has been demonstrated that this reduction of moisture loss is directly related to the prevention of winterkill. Research has shown that a plant with full turgidity (ie. filled with water) can survive periods of below-freezing temperatures very well.

Freeze damage to a plant occurs when ice crystals form around various bacteria present on all types of foliage. This causes the ice nucleation that initiates the freeze damage. When Envy has hardened on the plant it shields the leaf surface by forming a physical barrier to ice-nucleating bacteria. The polymer membrane that is formed by the hardening of the water-based polymer adheres to the plant as an invisible semi-permeable membrane providing anti-transpirant and frost-protecting properties. This protection includes abiotic "stress" factors (supporting the resistance against cold and drought and protecting against toxic cell damage). Envy does not clog the leaf stomata, nor does it retard growth or cause phytotoxicity. Plant photosynthesis is kept at a maximum and oxygen/carbon dioxide exchange is not affected. Envy is water-based, not solvent-based, and will not cause chemical injury to plants even at twice the recommended rate.
