These will look at the nutritional requirements of an orchid and the steps required to limit disease and pests in your orchid house. Bruce Hall will address unusual terete leaved Oncidium orchids for South America and Hans Schaible will introduce members to a wide variety of orchids which have their origins in Africa. A number of workshop activities are planned and we will hear a variety of orchid growing hints and techniques from many of our experienced growers. The very popular and successful plant auction will again take place in October. Check out the program attached to this newsletter to see what other highlights await you in 2024.

The monthly benching competition has been slightly rejigged for 2024. The new list was included in last month's newsletter along with a set of the new competition labels. Copies of these are also on the CHOS website. It's always a time saver if you fill out the labels before you arrive at the meeting and don't forget to put you name on the back of the competition label. If we don't know who you are then we can't award you any points. Please bring any pots or stands that you might need to support and better display your orchids. Orchids should be staked and tied according to the AOC rules which are exactly the same standard as expected at one of our shows. Remember that for most orchids [exceptions include multi-branched inflorescences and Den. Soft Canes] they should not be tied above the bottom flower and no ties should be on a flowers ovary. Plants should be benched as early as possible and at the latest by 7.15pm. Judging commences at 7.20pm. It will help the Committee greatly if you can place your plants in the correct categories on the show bench and if you are uncertain as to where it should be bplaced then please seek assistance from one of the officials.

Good luck to everyone for this year's monthly competition.

BITS AND PIECES:

- The 2024 Growing Plant Competition will commence in March this year with the plant allocation draw at the March meeting. Plants cost \$10 each and yours can be secured by getting your name on the application list and then paying \$10 to Paige [Cash or by Direct Deposit]. The plant selected for 2024 is still to be confirmed but will probably be a Mini Cattleya. If you would like to add this plant to your collection but not take part in the Growing Competition then that is acceptable but we would encourage you to see if you are up to meeting the challenge of growing this years plant. The final judging for the 2023 competition plant [Vanda falcata] will take place at the March meeting and trophies will be presented to the winners at the April or May meetings. Don't forget to bring along your Vanda falcata to both the February and the March meetings to gain valuable last points.
- The CHOS Annual Program has been published and a copy is attached with this newsletter. If you don't receive your newsletter by email then if you ask at the next meeting you will be able to receive a printed copy for your use. Please be aware that the program is flexible and could change without notice. It is usually updated each month on page 2 of the newsletter.
- This year there will again be opportunities for members to sell any excess plants they may have. The Autumn and Spring Shows are the major sales times and the CHOS charges members a 15% commission for these sales transactions. If you are selling NSW Native Orchids to the public then you require a CHOS Licence Tag. Therse are available from Show Officials. Two meetings have been set aside for sales by

members to other members and no commission is charged for these sales. You don't require a Licence Tag if you are selling NSW native orchids to other CHOS members. Members sales will take place this year during the February and June meetings so bring your sale plants and your money for the February meeting. There is a good chance you may score a bargain.
















It would be greatly appreciated if you would bring a contribution for members supper.



CHOS SUPPLIES OF ORCHID BARK: The CHOS now has a supply of Kiwi Bark and Charcoal.

Kiwi Orchid Bark is a hard, clean, uniformly graded *Pinus radiata* bark suitable for growing orchids. The Society sells 50 litre bags for \$45 each.

Kiwi bark comes in four sizes—No.2: 3 to 8mm; No.3: 8 to 20mm; No.4: 20 to 25mm;

No. 5: **25 to 50mm**. (The 8 to 20mm size would be equal to mixing 9 to 12 and 12 to 18mm grades of Orchiata bark and would be the ideal size for general potting purposes).

Supplies of 15mm charcoal (Orchid Char) are also available. These are in 19kg bags and sell at \$45 per bag.

Dendrobium Eureka Gold

Dendrobium Hamana Lake x Dendrobium Buderim Moonlight is registered as

Dendrobium Moonlight Dream

Dendrobium Red Emperor x Dendrobium Buderim Moonlight

and/or *Dendrobium* Buderim Moonlight x *Dendrobium* Red Emperor are both registered as **Dendrobium** First Time Lucky

[Note: When the Pod Parent and the Pollen Parent are reversed the off-spring still retains the same name]

CREATING DIFFERENT CLIMATIC ZONES IN YOUR ORCHID HOUSE

Three interesting tables taken [with permission] from a recent talk given at the WDOS November Conference. Most orchid growers have a variety of orchid genera in their orchid houses and have the problem of providing different microclimates within the one structure to allow a variety of orchids to grow happily. These tables will help you to know which plants to place together and what conditions you need to provide for their growth.

We have made the selection of these names based on Ed's family connections—one named after his eldest daughter, Michelle, and the other after his father, well know Victorian orchid grower and breeder, the late Ron Pearce.

If you happen to have any of these crosses then you should now change your label to the newly approved name. It is good to see Edward Pearce's legacy living on.

WHEN TWO POTS ARE OFTEN BETTER THAN ONE

- Many Coffs Harbour orchid growers have often wished they could grow and successfully flower a genus of orchid that is better adapted to cool to cold climatic conditions. Genera such as Masdevallia, Dracula and Disa come to mind. Some of these groups contain some types which are more heat tolerant than others and they are the ones which could be selected for growing in the Coffs Harbour area. If you reside in a slightly cooler area like Nana Glen, Ulong or Dorrigo then you will probably have success with more cold-loving varieties. For those who live on the coastal plain there is a trick which often helps to keep the root zone cooler and keeps these cooler growing plants happier. That trick is to double or triple pot the plant. This means you plant the orchid in a pot appropriate for it's size and then place that pot into a slightly larger, empty pot. The air between the two pots acts as an insulator and keeps the inner pot cooler. In addition some growers place sphagnum or potting bark between the inner and outer pots. This will hold moisture and further cool the inner pot. Other growers use a third pot as further insulation. Well worth a trial if you are trying to grow cool tolerant orchids. Placing the orchid in a cooler region of your green house [even under a bench] will greatly assist in climate control.
- Need to plant a large orchid and perhaps add some ballast so the pot wont fall over but then you don't want to use large amounts of expensive potting mix? A few larger rocks in the base of the pot will stabilise it. Then invert an empty smaller pot on top of the rocks. Now fill the main pot with potting mix and pot the plant as you normally would. Due to the inner empty pot you will use less potting mix. Even with out any rocks in the pot you could still save potting mix in a deep pot by using an inverted smaller pot in the base.
